This prompted some fantastic question writing from the children. We have also had a lovely time discussing our favourite toys in our history lessons. Children could confidently tell their peers about why their chosen toys evoked special memories - it was lovely to hear! The snow definitely brought some excitement for Red Kites. We enjoyed building snowmen and playing in the snow with our friends. Who would have thought that we would see such weather in March! We would like to thank all of our families for their continued efforts to read with their children at home. In June, pupils will take their Phonics Reading Check so it is important that reading continues to be a priority both at school and at home.











Merlin Class

What a busy start to the half term! We have enjoyed starting our new book 'Major Glad, Major Dizzy' Thankyou for bringing in a toy from home which inspired us to do some fantastic writing! In Maths, we are continuing with our multiplication and division topic where we have learnt about arrays, grouping and sharing and have related these to number sentences.

We celebrated World Book Day where we looked at the book, 'The Prettiest Flower' and used our creativity to paint a scene using watercolours. In Computing, we have finished our coding on scratch and have started looking at word processing and have been looking closer at the keyboard and its functions









In Science, we have been learning how we would survive on a desert island. Merlin class gave a lot of scientific reasons why they would need oxygen (to breathe air), water (to stay hydrated), food (to give energy) and shelter (to stay warm) in order to survive on that desert island.

In R.E, we have been discussing how we are all friends and have special qualities just like Jesus and his Disciples had. This term, we will be learning how Jesus is important to Christians.


Osprey Class:

Osprey class have started the new half term with lots of enthusiasm! We have loved the start to our 'Big Blue Whale' topic and have been amazed by learning lots about this fascinating creature. We have also started our new guided reading book, which is also based on whales! This story tells the tale of a young boy who meets a lost whale in the River Thames. The children enjoyed exploring real-life headlines from similar experiences in some of our biggest cities. In maths we have completed our unit on measure by learning how to calculate perimeter and adding cm and mm together. It was tricky when we had to convert some of the units of measurement, but the children demonstrated some excellent resilience and teamwork! We have now started our new topic on fractions.

We celebrated World Book Day by participating in the big book swap, and reading 'Under the Lemon Moon' - a tale about forgiveness which originated in Mexico.

We have been re-telling the Easter story in RE by focusing on a different day of Holy Week during our lessons. In Science the children are mid-way through their topic of 'Magnets and Forces' and have really impressed Mrs Hendry with their use of scientific vocabulary. We have also had a super time at swimming lessons! Well done Year 3!













Kestrel Class:

Over the last two weeks we've been putting the finishing touches to our book cover designs. Lots of new skills have been learnt, including making a paper mockup, matching design criteria, as well as cutting and joining using different methods. Most of us chose to use velcro or buttons to fasten together the edges of our products. If anyone needs a button stitching on, just call Kestrels for help! In science, we've finished off our topic about the different states of matter. This week, our focus has been evaporation and condensation. Everyone has written some fantastic explanations of how washing dries on the line. I'm sure that you'll have some volunteers at home now to help with the laundry!

Our R.E. sessions about parables have been interesting too. Everyone has asked some really thoughtful questions and come up with some good ideas for hidden meanings and messages.

In P.S.H.E. we've been delving into families and relationships. I am so impressed with the conversations

everyone has been having around different scenarios. We've all proven to be a well mannered bunch, who show respect and politeness to those we come into contact with.

In English we're starting a new book and so far, only a few clues have been revealed about its content and subject matter. We're getting great at using inference and deduction to figure things out. Well done Kestrels!

World book day has been a great chance to try out some new reading materials. We've completed some work on our theme of forgiveness and designed some lovely art-work that reflects the way we work together as a team and compromise, as well as forgive.

In maths, our topic has been length and perimeter. We're all doing really well with this topic and I think we may have some budding architects, engineers and fencing specialists in the group.

To top it all off - what an interesting way to end this last week. It's been great seeing just how lucky we are to have such wonderful school grounds to get out and about and enjoy the snow!
