What an action packed couple of weeks for Red Kite Class! In Design and Technology we have been learning about fruits and vegetables. We have prepared them, tasted them and had lots of fun making them into smoothies! In English, we have finished reading our Pathways book, 'The Curious Case of the Missing Mammoth'. We loved reading about the adventures of the baby mammoth and we have planned and written our own sequel called 'The Curious Case of the Missing Dinosaur'. In our stories, a baby dinosaur causes all sorts of mischief in a museum! We have been engaging in some new learning in Maths, about length, height, mass and capacity and we're really excited to have finished our second Maths book of the year! In PSHE, we have been learning about the importance of rules and how decisions get made. We have begun to understand how democracy works in society and we tried to make a fair decision ourselves. We listed what we liked to do as a special activity









in school, we voted for it and then we got to do it - we chose an extra play time! In Science, we have been continuing with our unit of comparing materials. Some of us asked some very interesting questions about the school and we have explored some of the answers this week. A big thank you to Annabella's Mum who gave me some old photographs and answered some questions about how the school has changed since she was here. We have designed and made a healthy wrap in DT, where some of us enjoyed tasting new foods. In English, we have been continuing with our Literacy Pathways book, Major Glad and Major Dizzy where we have been using our senses to explore what it would be like under the floorboards. We went under the tables, turned the lights off to imagine we were really there! In Maths, the children are working hard on their 5 times table! A polite reminder to all parents to continue to listen to the children read. Strive for 5! I hope you all have a lovely Easter!









Osprey Class:

Osprey class have reached the end of our spring term with a bang! We have completed our maths topic of fractions and have just started our new unit of work – Mass. We are looking forward to adding, subtracting and solving problems related to the mass of different objects. We loved our TT Rockstars battle and some of us are making fantastic progress with our times tables - remember, practice makes permanent! In English, we have researched and created our own website articles full of facts about blue whales, and have completed some persuasive writing – we want our readers to be convinced to protect our whales! It's surprising how making a tiny change can make a huge difference. In D&T we have researched, designed and created our own electronic posters. We carried out peer assessment on each other's work and gave feedback. Then we learned how to assemble electronic components together to make a circuit to light up our posters. Our finished pieces would look at home in the Natural History Museum! We have really enjoyed our PE topic of dance, and have been developing some of our movement skills in other lessons too. It's amazing to see how all our areas of learning link together. Have a wonderful Easter break!











Kestrel Class:

What an enjoyable last couple of weeks it has been! This week, two representatives from our class have taken part in a mini Olympics event at the local sports centre. A good time has been had by all involved and lots of new sports have been tried out by both staff and pupils. In our English work, we've been building our vocabulary and looking at ways of avoiding repetition in our writing. We've then looked at how to change reported speech into direct speech, using the correct tenses in our sentences. It's really been quite tricky, but we're starting to get the hang of using inverted commas correctly. Our Geography unit is - you guessed it - about volcanoes! (Well, actually it's about 'why people live near volcanoes.') As part of our work we're looking at different types of









mountain formations and about the different layers of the earth - the inner core, outer core, mantle and crust. We now understand that tectonic plates are sections of the earth's crust that move in different ways and that this movement causes mountains to be formed, as well as causes earthquakes.

In our Maths unit this term, we have finished our investigations into length and perimeter and are now looking into fractions and equivalence. It's proving to be an interesting topic and everyone is doing brilliantly - especially when the subject of fractions and food crops up! So far we have mainly looked at proper / improper fractions and mixed numbers.

Design Technology sessions are always enjoyed by Kestrel Class. We're now starting to look at recipes and how they can be changed for different occasions / groups of people. We can't wait



to get to the tasting part after the Easter holiday! We've finished off the term in style too. We all very much enjoyed meeting our rockstar challenge set by Miss Edwards and absolutely sang up a storm with Queen's 'Radio Ga Ga.' Even though we didn't win the 'sing off,' we're all incredibly proud of the hard work we're putting into learning our times-tables. Keep going everyone. We need to be really speedy!

- Ensure that school reading books return in a good condition ready for the next pupil to use


Teachers will support you by:
